Here's a look at what might impact the **software industry** in 2022.



Old laws don't work with new technology Because software technology evolves quicker than tax policy, old laws don't typically fit neatly with new products and services.

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Software is categorized up to 10 different ways across 45 states

Is it canned or custom software? Digital or physical? Stand-alone or does it come with a service? It's all taxed differently.

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Tax on bundled products and services is hard to determine

Depending on the state, sales tax applies to sales of subscription packages that also contain taxable items.



Tax laws on software are in constant flux

Digital products may be too difficult to consistently define, according to the Multistate Tax Commission.

It's impossible for a business to calculate sales tax rates accurately without a full 9-digit ZIP code, yet sellers often don't collect a buyer's full address because nothing tangible is ever delivered.

The Streamlined Sales Tax Governing Board recommends that if a seller does not obtain a complete street address or 9-digit ZIP code, the seller should calculate and collect the tax at the highest combined state and local rates in the 5-digit ZIP code for digital goods and services.

"The challenge for sourcing digital goods is they can be used in multiple locations and the seller often doesn't know where the buyer uses the goods."
